

Cloud County Marathon Dance Raises Diabetes Association Funds

Twelve determined dancers, backed up by members of the Cloud County Community Medical Arts Club, shuffled their way through 31 hours of a disco dance marathon at the Concordia Armory last weekend and raised more than \$900 for the Diabetes Association in Wichita.

Starting at 7 p.m. Friday and continuing until 2 a.m. Sunday, the participants kicked and twirled, swung and swayed, and eventually hung wearily onto their partners, as the hours crept along. They received a five-minute break every

hour, a 15-minute break after every three hours, and were served meals during a 30-minute break every six hours. These breaks totaled two hours, so actual dancing time was 29 hours, said Medical Arts club president Kirk Kelley.
